WHEN WE COME BACK to our places after taking communion, we ought to look at our next-door neighbours with awe and amazement. The person next to me – whom I may love deeply, may not know at all, may dislike, may even fear – is God's special, honoured guest, praying Christ's prayer, living from Christ's life. Just for this moment, they are touched with the glory of the end of all things; and so are we. And here are the things of the world, God's natural gifts, turned into effervescent signs of God's re-creation and renewing love. They too are what God wants them to be at the end of everything, signs of overflowing love. When Christians meet for worship they don't just share bread and wine; they gather to be told who they are, not only in action but in word, in story and song and above all in the story and song of the Bible. The sharing of Holy Communion takes place in the context of listening to this story, the story of God's dealings with the world in which God shows who he is; and as that story is read and reflected on, the community recognises that it belongs in the same frame of reference. It lives here and now in fellowship with all those that God has invited and inspired. In the Sunday congregation, Abraham, Moses, Ezekiel and the rest stand invisibly alongside us; we are part of a covenant people whose origins go right back to the invisible distance, barely known outside legend and epic, yet absolutely real and continuous. This is why Christians say that the Bible is 'the Word of God' here and now. A word is spoken and heard; when the Bible is read to us in the midst of the congregation, it is God who is telling us our history, and our identity. Martin Luther said of the Bible, *de te loquitur*, 'it's talking about you'. In that sense, Scripture always stand alongside sacrament as the measure of who we are. ✨ *TOKENS OF TRUST (2007) by Rowan Williams*

For he that will love life, and see good days, let him refrain his tongue from evil, and his lips that they speak no guile. Let him eschew evil, and do good; let him seek peace, and ensue it. For the eyes of the Lord are over the righteous, and his ears are open unto their prayers: but the face of the Lord is against them that do evil. St Luke 5.1-11

AT THAT TIME: It came to pass, that as the people pressed upon Jesus to hear the word of God, he stood by the lake of Gennesaret, and saw two ships standing by the lake: but the fishermen were gone out of them, and were washing their nets. And he entered into one of the ships, which was Simon's, and prayed him that he

would thrust out a little from the land. And he sat down, and taught the people out of the ship. Now when he had left speaking, he said unto Simon: 'Launch out into the deep, and let down your nets for a draught.' And Simon answering said unto him: 'Master, we have toiled all the night, and have taken nothing: nevertheless at thy word I will let down the net.' And when they had this done, they inclosed a great multitude of fishes: and their net brake. And they beckoned unto their partners, which were in the other ship, that they should come and help them. And they came, and filled both the ships, so that they began to sink. When Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying: 'Depart from me; for I am a sinful man, O Lord.' For he was astonished, and all that were with him, at the draught of the fishes which they had taken: and so was also James, and John, the sons of Zebedee, which were partners with Simon. And Jesus said unto Simon: 'Fear not; from henceforth thou shalt catch men.' And when they had brought their ships to land, they forsook all, and followed him.
